Recent Developments in North Korea: Succession and the Prospects for Reform

North Korea has undergone its second familial succession, raising questions about both the future political stability of the country, the prospects for reform and the status of nuclear talks. Drawing on new research on both the political leadership and the political economy of North Korea, Prof. Haggard considers developments within the country but also the policy options facing the South Korea, China and the United States.

Lawrence and Sallye Krause Distinguished Professor Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies

Stephan Haggard is the Lawrence and Sallye Krause Distinguished Professor at the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies (IR/PS) at the University of California, San Diego (UCSD). He has written widely on the international relations and politics of the Asia-Pacific, including *Pathways from the Periphery* (1990), *The Political Economy of Democratic Transitions* (1995, with Robert Kaufman), *The Political Economy of the Asian Financial Crisis* (2000) and *Development, Democracy, and Welfare States: Latin America, East Asia and Eastern Europe* (2008, with Robert Kaufman). He has recently conducted extensive research on North Korea with Marcus Noland, and written two books on the country: *Famine in North Korea: Markets, Aid and Reform* (2007) and *Witness to Transformation: Refugee Insights into North Korea.* They have conducted surveys of Chinese and South Korean firms doing business in North Korea for a third volume on the North Korean political economy.
