Vertical Support and Horizontal Networks in China

The seminar discusses the changing roles and importance of Beijing's vertical support and interlocal networks in both Maoist and post-Mao China. More specifically, it examines the evolving importance of four measures in mitigating regional disparities: (1) the center's resource support; (2) the center's policy support; (3) the vertically-induced horizontal networks; and (4) voluntarily-formed horizontal networks.

Jae Ho CHUNG is a professor of international relations and Director of the Program on US-China Relations at Seoul National University. Professor Chung, a graduate of Seoul National University, Brown University and the University of Michigan, taught at the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology during 1993-96 and was a CNAPS Fellow at the Brookings Institution during 2002-3. Professor Chung is the author or editor of fourteen books, including *Central Control and Local Discretion in China* (Oxford University Press, 2000), *Between Ally and Partner* (Columbia University Press, 2007), and *China's Crisis Management* (Routledge, 2011). Professor Chung is the founder of the Asian Network for the Study of Local China (ANSLoC: http://www.ansloc.net). Professor Chung is also a recipient of Seoul National University's Best Researcher Award in 2009 and of the Korean Association for International Studies' Best Book Award in 2012.
